The next step is to create samples of the refreshed SGGHS school uniform and make any final adjustments prior to production.

I am pleased to report that the design concepts agreed upon certainly reflect a more refreshed and updated look, while also maintaining comfort, durability and cost considerations. I am excited to finally see the time invested into the consultation and design process behind the scenes realised and I am sure that the refreshed look will be well-received by the community.

The school is planning to phase in the new uniform from 2022, commencing with the junior uniform in Year 7 2022 and senior uniform in Year 10 2022.


I have shared the designs with the staff at the start of the year, parents/carers at the first Mothers' Committee and P&C meetings of the year as well as with the Year 9 students, who will be the first existing cohort to transition into the new senior uniform from 2022. The school has also made the decision to move to one uniform designer and supplier to mitigate the variance in uniform items and supply/stock issues that have been identified by the Uniform Shop operators in the past.

I have shared below the design concept images for the junior, senior and sport uniforms below for the community to view.

While many of the existing elements that are much loved by the students remain, a few enhancements

have been included such a new summer and winter tunic for the junior students that are distinctly different from each other, the change in colour for the jumper to the school red, the introduction of a cardigan and a re-design of the sport uniform both in colour and fit.







Walkathon

On Wednesday 31 March the annual St George Girls High School Walkathon will be held. This is always a very special and unique day for our school and the staff and students always have a great day together. The organisation for this year's Walkathon will be slightly different to that in the past to accommodate the DoE COVID-19 guidelines for whole school activities. The students will still participate in a supervised walk, however the activities usually undertaken at Peter Depena Reserve will now take place at the school.

This highly anticipated school event highlights the real sense of school spirit that exists at St George. Such events are only possible because of the quality students we have at the school and this event showcases the very best of St George. Thank you to the Walkathon organiser Mr Moncrieff and the Year 12 Advisor (Mrs Jospe) and Assistant Advisor (Ms Torrisi) for their support in organising this activity for us all to enjoy. A very BIG thank you to our Year 12 students who will take the responsibility for providing enough food and activity options to keep everyone engaged and well fed over the afternoon back at school. They have also needed to make the necessary modifications to their planned stalls to ensure that they comply with the COVID-19 regulations necessary.

Winter Uniform Change Over

As the cooler weather will soon approach, I wanted to remind our community that the official date for the start of winter uniform will be **Monday 3 May (Term 2 Week 3)**. The school uniform is a vital element that unites our students. Overall the standard is very high, however I would like to see this maintained particularly throughout the cooler months. I strongly encourage parents to check the status of their daughter's winter uniform and if you find that you need to purchase items, be sure to do so early while stocks are available.

A Road Safety Message and Behaviour of Students on Public Transport

I have received a number of concerning complaints from the community relating to the road crossing behaviours on display from our students during the morning and afternoon peak times. The students have been reminded of the expectations the school has in relation to how they walk to and from school each day. The students know that they are expected to use the designated crossings provided and to take due care for their safety. Unfortunately, it appears that the students continue cross dangerously across the roads, often darting between the cars and not paying attention to traffic conditions around them,



particularly if they are on their mobile phone. I am very concerned that this will result in a pedestrian accident if nothing changes. I have been provided with a few images to demonstrate the behaviours of the students during this time and I am now asking for the support from our parents/carers to reinforce this important road safety message with their daughters.

I am also in discussions with a number of development companies who are commencing their projects in the surrounding streets and this will inevitably impact upon the traffic conditions around the school. I will communicate regularly with the community about any anticipated disruptions or activities that will impact upon school operations, however we are working together in an attempt to minimise this disruption as much as practical. This increase in development will also see heavy vehicles and additional traffic congestion in the neighbouring streets, adding additional safety concerns for the students on their way to and from school.



Over the past few weeks I have also received disappointing complaints from commuters, particularly those travelling on the train about the behaviour of some of our students. The commuters have mentioned that students from our school are not offering their seats (after being asked politely) for the elderly commuters in the carriage. It has also been expressed that SGGHS students are not wearing face masks as required. I am bitterly disappointed that I continue to receive these complaints despite numerous reminders about what is expected. I now ask for the support from parents/carers to reinforce these important messages about the behaviour of students when travelling to and from school on public transport.



Updated Covid-19 Advice for NSW Schools and Families

Commencing this week, NSW public schools will see a further easing of the COVID-19 restrictions in place. The Department of Education (DoE) has also continued to work with NSW Health to revise the current advice to schools. The DoE website is the most appropriate place to access the most up to date information for families and this can be accessed via the following link; https://education.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/advice-for-families

It is still very important that we all remain vigilant in implementing COVID-safe practices in our schools and some level of restrictions and guidelines will remain in place for some time. Can I again remind our parents/carers that students are not to attend school if they are unwell, even if they only have the mildest of symptoms. Any student who has been unwell and has taken a COVID-19 test, are permitted to return to school only after providing the office with a negative COVID-19 test result and are symptom-free. If a student presents to school unwell, parents/carers will be contacted and the student will be sent home to recover.

It is important to be aware that in the updated advice for families released this week, it clearly states that students who do not undertake a COVID-19 test will not be permitted to return to school for a 10-day period. Additionally, they must be symptom-free for at least 3 days prior to returning to school.

Deputy Principal's Report – Teaching and Learning

Expression of Interest – 2021 HSC Presiding Officer Role

Il schools are required to appoint a Presiding Officer who will oversee the HSC Examinations at the school.

Our current Presiding Officer is unable to fulfil this role in 2021 so we are seeking expressions of interest from our school community to take on this vital role for the 2021 HSC Examinations.

The attached flyer provides general information about the role, eligibility and the essential requirements of this position. Anyone interested in this role, or wanting further information about the role and responsibilities should **contact Ms Abson. Expressions of Interest close Tuesday 16 March.** Presiding Officer nominations must be submitted to NESA by Friday 26 March.

Assessment Booklets

Students and parents/carers are able to access all assessment information through the portal, including the assessment policy and procedures, calendar overview of scheduled task dates and subject outlines. It is important that students understand their responsibilities in regards to completing tasks and what to do if they are sick or late on the day of a task. Students are strongly encouraged to keep a copy of the calendar either in their folder or above their desk and highlight when their assessment tasks are scheduled so they can prepare and organise their time effectively. Please note that the dates published may need to change for various reasons. All students will be notified by their teacher in writing of any date changes and the assessment notification should always be what the students follow as the correct scheduled assessment task date. Any student in Year 7, 9 or 11 who has not returned their signed assessment slip to Mrs Housego should do so by the end of the term.

Year 12 Assessment Block 2

Assessment Block 2 commenced on Monday 8 March and will continue until Friday 19 March. There are no normal timetabled lessons during an assessment block and students are only required at school when they have a scheduled assessment task. Students are reminded that they are to be in full school uniform and arrive at school at least 20 minutes prior to the scheduled start time. If a student is unable to attend on the day of a scheduled examination due to illness/misadventure, please call the front office who will inform the Year 12 Deputy Principal – Ms Abson, who will then seek to reschedule the examination to the next available examination slot. A reminder that all documentation, medical or otherwise must be provided and dated to correspond with the task missed.

SGGHS Professional Learning Update

Professional learning for all teachers and executive is a vital component of the performance and development process. It facilitates growth and enhances the quality of teaching and learning for students. Professional learning and collaborative practice is a priority at St George Girls High School and will continue to feature prominently in the 2021-2024 Strategic Improvement Plan and Strategic Direction initiatives.

Staff actively engage in a wide range of targeted professional learning opportunities throughout the year which link directly to a curriculum area, identified goals outlined in individual Performance and Development Plans, or to the school's strategic directions and key initiatives. In the first half of Term 1, SGGHS staff have engaged in the following professional learning:

2020 HSC Analysis

As part of the agenda for the second School Development Day at the start of the year, the 2020 HSC analysis session provided the opportunity for staff to work collaboratively with colleagues on completing a course specific analysis of 2020 HSC results. The activities focused on targeting the top 2 HSC Bands (Band 5 and Band 6), identifying areas of strength, areas for development, modifications needed to teaching programs as well as teaching and learning strategies, resources required to implement changes and professional learning needs to support the developed plan for the 2021 HSC. The session allowed for analysis of student data through SCOUT and RAP (Results Analysis Package) and accessing the various graphs and tables available. In the coming 2 week, all faculty Head Teachers will meet with the Senior Executive to discuss their analysis and plans to support the delivery of the 2021 HSC courses.

HSC Professional Learning: A quality teaching practice initiative

The innovative HSC Professional Learning: A quality teaching practice initiative is professional learning available in Term 1 for Stage 6 teachers across a number of courses.

The professional learning explores proven methods for achieving student lift with expert HSC Teachers and colleagues from across the state. A number of SGGHS staff have participated in these sessions in the areas of Modern History, Biology and Visual Arts.

Executive Leadership Team - Professional Learning Day

The Executive Leadership Day earlier this term continued to focus on the development of the 2021-2024 Strategic Improvement Plan. The Executive had the opportunity to continue the work from Term 4 and look further at Strategic Direction 2 - Collaborative Practice, and start developing ideas around the Improvement Measures and Success Criteria components of the SIP. Working in small groups, the Executive also began to draft purpose statements, key initiatives and activities for Strategic Direction 1



Winter Uniform

Winter Uniform will commence in Term 2 Week 3. Students are reminded that they are to be in full school uniform every day and if not, they should follow the school's procedures for obtaining either a uniform pass or uniform infringement. Outlined below are uniform requirements specific to the winter uniform:

Junior Uniform:

- White Long-sleeved shirt
- Tie
- Tailored Trousers (optional)

Senior Uniform:

- St George all season skirt
- White Long-sleeved shirt
- Tailored Trousers (optional)

• Year 12 students who are wearing the Year 12 jersey may only wear the white long-sleeved shirt under the jersey. **General uniform requirements:**

- Black leather flat lace up school shoes
- School blazer, jumper or navy overcoat may be worn in winter.
- Neck scarves in winter must be red, white or navy blue.
- White plain over ankle length socks or beige, navy or black tights in winter.
- Sports Jackets may be worn as uniform on non-sport days for additional warmth.
- Black jumpers, cardigans or hoodies <u>are not permitted</u>.
- Skivvies are not permitted.



Deputy Principal's Report – Curriculum

2021 Changes to NAPLAN

n 21 May this year, our Year 7 and Year 9 students will be completing the NAPLAN tests via the online format. The rollout for NAPAN online has commenced since 2018 with the majority of schools in NSW now completing this assessment online. There are many benefits that the schools previously using the online platform have found and we think it will be an important diagnostic tool that will assist our students to engage further in the assessment and perform at a higher level.

The NAPLAN Online test, across Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy, is a computerised tailored test that adapts to student responses. As students complete set questions, the testing platform then offers varied pathways to present students with questions that may be more or less difficult. This will allow for our students to participate in the more challenging questions available within this format and this will, in turn, lead to more precise results that accurately reflect the student's true level of achievement. Further to question pathways, the online test is designed in sections. A student's answers to one section of the test will determine the next section to appear on the student's screen. At the end of a test section, a notification screen reminds students to check their answers before proceeding to the next section. This guidance and prompting will reinforce the importance of particular questions and will ultimately assist students in navigating their test effectively.

NAPLAN tests are an essential assessment tool that allows us as a school to see how our students are progressing in core areas of literacy and numeracy against the national standard, while comparing their achievement to their peers throughout Australia. We are excited to observe and track the performance of our students engaging with the online platform, where they will get to explore the various pathways of questions including the higher order challenging questions, only available in the online platform set up.

To assist the students to appropriately prepare and adapt to the new online platform, I will be facilitating some practice tests at the back end of this term. This will enable all students to become familiar with the new style of testing and get exposure to the interactive format that the questions are presented in. The practice tests are not for the purpose of gathering data and no scores will be recorded. These practice sessions are solely for the purpose of familiarisation within the platform. Information regarding when the practice sessions will be held will be communicated in the coming weeks.

Parent Teacher Evening

We have our first scheduled Parent Teacher evening for the year coming up on Tuesday 30 March and this will be for Year 7 and 12 students and families. We have been closely following the DoE COVID 19 Safety guidelines regarding parent meetings onsite and, as it currently stands, we are able to hold Parent Teacher meetings with appropriate safety measures in place.

The interviews are scheduled to commence from 3:30pm and the details regarding how the evening will run, the venues in use and the safety measures in place will be communicated in more depth to parents in the coming week. As per usual all bookings will be made via the School Interviews platform and will be available on the website at least two weeks prior to the evening ensuring that families have enough time to book appointments with their daughter's class teachers. It is advisable to make your bookings as soon as the documentation comes out, as spaces and times will be limited.

For our new Year 7 students and families, this Parent Teacher evening will provide a welcomed opportunity for you to visit our school, meet with your daughter's teachers and discuss how your daughter is managing the transition into High School.

For Year 12 students and Parents, this will be a valuable opportunity to receive feedback on current progress as well as identify areas for continued refinement and consolidation. In the case that families are unable to attend, Year 12 students will receive their Mid-Course report early in Term 2 and this too will provide students and families with targeted feedback and guidance for continued improvement towards the HSC.

We look forward to finally welcoming parents and families back on site facilitating important conversations around student growth and improvement.

2021 Confirmed Curriculum Patterns

The opportunity for students to move and change their Stage 4/5 Elective or Preliminary subjects has now closed. All students have settled into the subjects for 2021 and should be well underway with their studies. Now that curriculum patterns are locked in, it is a perfect time to begin to map out all the upcoming assessment tasks for each term, as they are listed in the assessment booklet.

To assist our Year 11 and 12 students achieve their personal best and optimise their level of achievement, students are encouraged to sustain a workable amount of units within their pattern of study. Year 11 students encouraged to have a pattern of study inclusive of 12-13 units and for Year 12 students we strongly encourage a pattern of study inclusive of 10-11 units. Year 11 and 12 students are able to drop a subject at any point throughout the year, and can do so as long as they meet the mandatory minimum requirements for units studied.

Vaping

It has been bought to our attention that some students, across various year groups, may be experimenting with vaping. We are encouraging all parents and families to become familiar with what vaping is and to have honest conversations with your daughters if you have concerns.

Vaping is performed via electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes which are battery operated devices that heat a liquid to produce a vapour that users inhale. Vaping devices may be shaped and coloured to make them look like cigarettes or other tobacco products like cigars, cigarillos, pipes, hookahs, shishas and sometimes they look like everyday items such as pens, USB memory sticks or makeup equipment such as lip sticks and concealer products. Vaping among teenagers is currently on the rise and that is largely due to the fact that it is being presented using fun flavours, tech devices and is promoted as harmless. This is most definitely not the case as Vaping products are commonly being imported and illegally, resulting in no regulation on the products and chemicals that are being inhaled. When using an e-cigarette, the user inhales and exhales the vapour from the heated e-liquid. E-liquid contains a range of chemicals and it may or may not contain nicotine. Many of these products have been found to use nicotine salts in vapes rather than regular nicotine. Salts allow higher concentrations to be inhaled more easily and absorbed more quickly.

The School is aware of increased usage among young people. We are committed to ensuring that our students do not engage in any vaping on school grounds as well as travelling to and from school in school uniform. We are continually raising awareness with all staff and providing current and up to date information regarding vaping and potential devices that are being used. If a student is caught vaping or there is firm reasonable belief that they may have vaping products on them or in their possession, parents will be contacted and DoE and school protocols around having illegal products on school premises will be followed.

Some Tips for success for all students!!

- Start 'planting the seed' early on in the school term with a good schedule at home that should include: a good homework routine, a good time for bed and of course a **responsible use of electronic devices which includes when and where** the electronic devices will be turned off for the night.
- Separate homework time from screen time. This allows for better concentration and focus on the concepts and questions when attempting them.
- Always allow 20 min at the start of the week to plan your homework/study routine for that week.

Homework routine?

- Homework is an important process to master concepts and content in Mathematics.
- Homework is usually given at the end of each lesson.
- When completing homework tasks it is important to show working (where necessary), mark the work and resolve any errors.
- If students are having difficulty understanding a concept or a particular problem, then they should:
 - > seek assistance from the teacher
 - > review the notes and examples in class or
 - > attend the Mathematics Homework centre (see below)

The Mathematics Homework Centre has been running for 5 years and it is on again this year. This year the Centre will be open on **Wednesday** between 3.30pm and 5.00pm and it is held in the library. Students have a chance to request specialised help from talented mathematicians and tutors, while also making a head-start on their homework. The art of Lunar New Year

Commenting on Lynn's artwork, Sarah Kalidis said: "The work is very joyous and cheerful, the bright colours are happy and engaging, and the use of greenery celebrates life and growth. The gathering of the oxen signifies togetherness and hope which is all too important at this time."

This year a new prize was offered for calligraphy as part of the competition . The contest was open to adults with 27 entries received.

The winner was Tom Tang, a calligraphy teacher at CASS Language School (Kogarah). Mr Tang's work was selected by an online poll with more than 3,000 people voting.
