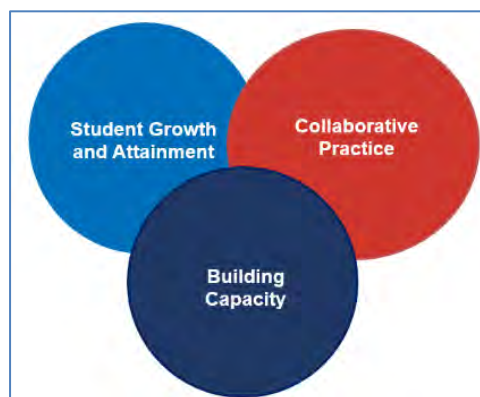
Principal's Message

Dear Parents/Carers and Students,

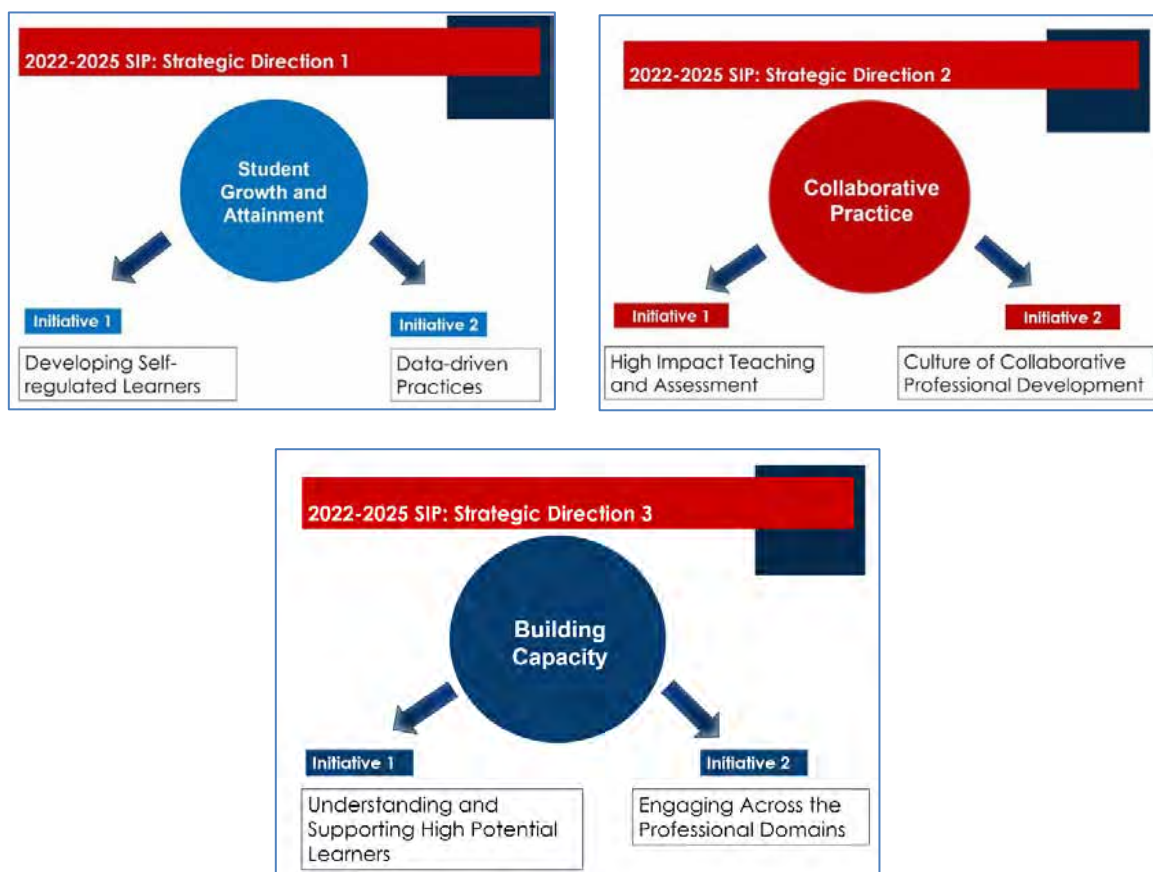
Welcome back to Term 2. I hope you feel refreshed and recharged after the break and are ready to launch into a new term of engaging learning and the exciting school events and activities that are planned to take place throughout the term ahead.

Official Launch of the Revised SGGHS 2022-2025 Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP)

During the Term 2 School Development Day, I had the opportunity to launch the revised 2022-2025 SGGHS Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP) to the staff. While much of the original high impact and evidence-based work planned remains in place, we have had the welcomed opportunity as a school to review and further refine our 2022-2025 SIP initiatives and activities following the DoE External Validation process that took place last year. By the end of this term the updated 2022-2025 SIP will be endorsed by our Director Educational Leadership, Mrs Laretta Claus and uploaded on the SGGHS website.



I look forward to undertaking the important body of work contained in the SIP together as a school as I know we have refined a high impact blueprint for further school development and improvement. The visuals below highlight the 2 initiatives that align to our 3 identified strategic directions.



Term 2 Staffing Update

Welcome onboard to Mr Thompson who joins our school in a permanent capacity (3 days per week – Monday, Tuesday and Thursday) in the PDHPE Faculty. I know that Mr Thompson has settled in well to the school and will make a valuable contribution in the years to come.

We also welcome back to SGGHS Mrs Hillier who returns from maternity leave in the English Faculty on Thursday and Friday and Mrs Salisbury who returns to the PDHPE Faculty on Wednesday and Friday. Ms Tang in Social Sciences will work full-time for the balance of 2022, replacing Mrs Rahmi who is on maternity leave and Ms Barbagallo also returns from maternity leave, working 3 days per week - Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from the start of this term.

Updated Information for Students and Families Regarding Term 2 School Operations

The COVID-Safe settings that we have now become familiar with will remain largely the same and will continue this term. These 'baseline measures' are aligned to the NSW Government's general community settings and include:

- rapid antigen testing for symptomatic students and staff
- vaccinations – including booster shots (from 3 months after your child's primary Covid-19 dose) are encouraged for all eligible students and their families. Staff and volunteers on school grounds are to follow vaccination guidelines
- ventilation
- good hygiene practices
- enhanced cleaning.



Continuing these 'baseline measures' will allow us to prioritise student and staff wellbeing while giving our learners a consistent and productive learning environment this term.

What's New in Term 2?

As we head into the cooler months, the DoE has updated the Covid-Smart measures in place for school operations in consultation with NSW Health, to provide additional protection to our school community.

Change to close contact isolation requirements

On 20 April the NSW Premier announced that from 22 April 2022, close contacts (including household contacts) could leave home isolation with certain restrictions. The announcement means that from Week 1 of Term 2, students and staff who are identified as close contacts will be able to attend school with the following risk mitigations in place:

- Parents/carers must notify the school if your child has been identified as a close contact and are intending to return to school.
- Your child should conduct a daily rapid antigen test (RAT) and receive a negative result each morning before attending school for **5 subsequent school days** as part of your personal responsibility to minimise the risk of transmission.
- High school students must wear a mask indoors at all times except when eating or exercising, for 5 subsequent school days.
- No student identified as a close contact will be permitted to participate in overnight excursions, including school camps.
- Visitors in contact with students including volunteers, allied health partners and staff providing professional learning who are close contacts should conduct a daily RAT and return a negative result before attending the school site. They must also wear a mask indoors at all times (except when eating or exercising) if they are 12 years old or over. If attending a school site and interacting with students for an extended period of time, the visitor should advise the school that they are a close contact.
- In line with these changes, students with health conditions should speak with their treating medical practitioner or specialist to review their health support plan or Covid-19 action plan and speak with the school around any local considerations.

Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs)

The DoE will continue to supply RAT kits to students and staff to support symptomatic testing and testing for close contacts returning to school. Within the first three weeks of term we will provide **1 multipack of rapid antigen tests per student**. Once these DoE supplied RATs are exhausted, please continue to access PCR tests and store-purchased RATs which are now readily available in the community or let the school know that you need more and we will try and assist.



Masks

The latest NSW Health advice recommends wearing a mask for people who have recovered from Covid-19 and recently completed their 7-day isolation period **for an additional 3 days** (from days 8 to 10 after receiving a positive Covid-19 result). Additionally, mask wearing is mandatory for staff and high school students returning to school as close contacts for 5 days.



Responding to our local situation

We will continue to liaise with NSW Health and the DoE Health and Safety case management team to ensure our Covid-Smart settings keep-up with the latest developments. If local conditions require it, this may mean temporarily reintroducing some additional Covid-Smart settings including:

- mask wearing for all staff and students in Year 7 and above
- directing cohorts to learn from home for short periods of time
- postponing or limiting non-essential activities like excursions, indoor assemblies and visitors to the school.

I will make sure to update the community at the earliest opportunity if any of these additional measures are required in Term 2.

Ventilation

The NSW Department of Education is reviewing environmental differences across NSW as part of their winter ventilation planning, ensuring that local climatic conditions at each school are considered. The DoE will provide local guidance to schools, including advice on maximising natural ventilation while balancing thermal comfort and the use of indoor and outdoor learning areas for school activities to support schools to adapt to local climate conditions through the winter months.



Reducing the risk of illness this winter

Finally, it's important to note NSW Health's advice to reduce our risk of not only Covid-19, but also other illnesses that may affect our school this winter like the flu. We can all protect our loved ones and our community by:



- taking a RAT before visiting vulnerable loved ones or going to large gatherings and events
- staying home if unwell
- keeping up to date with our vaccinations – including the flu vaccine, which is available from your local GP or pharmacy. Flu vaccines are free for all children aged 6 months to under 5 years, or for a small charge for those aged 5 years and older
- getting tested immediately for Covid-19 if you become symptomatic and isolating until you receive a negative result
- practicing good hand hygiene by washing regularly with soap and water

On Wednesday 6 April the SGGHS Walkathon was held. This is always a very special and unique day for our school and the staff and students always have a great day together. Unfortunately, due to wet weather the decision was made not to have the students and staff participate in a supervised walk, yet the Year 12 organised stalls and activities were still able to go ahead. Thank you to our Walkathon organiser, Mr Gordon Moncrieff and the Year 12 Cohort Team – Deputy Principal in Charge of Year 12, Mrs Amber Housego, Year 12 Year Adviser Miss Alex Neave and Assistant Year Adviser Mr Neil Walters for their support in organising this activity. An acknowledgement must also go to our Year 12 Prefect team and students who so capably absorbed the responsibility for providing enough food and activity options to keep everyone engaged and well-fed throughout the afternoon, and for their help cleaning up so diligently at the conclusion of the day. Anzac Day Assembly

Anzac Day marks the anniversary of the landing at Gallipoli. Like hundreds of thousands of our fellow citizens, who gather at memorials in cities, suburbs and towns across Australia, we as a school hosted our Anzac Day assembly on Thursday 28 April to commemorate one of the most significant events in our national calendar.

It is now a long-standing tradition that on Anzac Day we all pause to remember those that offered up their life in the defence of their nation and community, which is the greatest contribution any citizen can make. This tradition is as relevant today as it was when our troops landed on the beaches of Gallipoli in 1915. We only have to recall those Australians that have died or been injured in recent years on operations overseas and within Australia to protect Australia and its national interests.

Our Year 10 History students led the SGGHS commemorative **Anzac Day Assembly for Years 7, 8 and 9**. I would like to thank our History Faculty, in particular Mr Boland and Mr Nousis for organising this special assembly and the resources and activities that were also made available to students in Years 10 – 12 to commemorate this occasion in classrooms during the assembly time. Each year the Enviro Council also places rosemary from the school garden on the assembly seats for all students and staff to wear as a symbol of remembrance on the day.

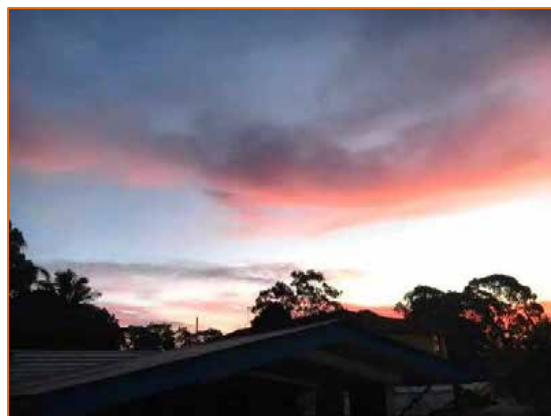

SGGHS Professional Learning Update

Term 2 School Development Day (SDD)

Our recent School Development Day focused on key initiatives outlined in the new 2022-2025 SIP. Staff participated in the following three sessions:

Session 1: Workshop Rotation

In the morning session, staff rotated through three workshops that linked to the SIP and school procedures. The three sessions were an introduction to the updated 2022-2025 SIP, Explicit Teaching and Learning Intentions/Success Criteria and the introduction to School Bytes – a new platform that has been implemented to streamline and enhance school processes for staff.

Session 2: CESE: Revisiting Gifted Education Literature Review

Staff completed the CESE online professional learning module that provided the opportunity for staff to engage with the literature review and reflect on the research and evidence-based practice linked to high potential and gifted (HPG) learners. Staff completed reflection questions that allowed them to consider their current thinking around teaching practice for HPG learners and identify areas for future focus as part of their own professional learning and teaching practice.

Session 3: Faculty Improvement Plan (FIP)

In the afternoon session, faculties focused on finalising their Course FIP which was developed following a comprehensive analysis of the 2021 HSC data that was undertaken in Term 1. Course FIPs across all faculties are linked to the HSC Top 2 Bands DoE target, identifying modifications that will be made to teaching programs and/or practice, teaching and learning strategies, resources required to implement changes, professional learning needs to support the developed plan for the 2022 HSC cohort and an evaluation plan.

Engagement in Professional Learning

Since the March Gazette, staff at SGGHS have continued to participate in many professional learning opportunities even with Covid-19 restrictions limiting the opportunities for staff. Most professional learning was conducted online and focussed on curriculum and HSC support.

Dr Justin Coulson presents: Encouraging good behaviour

Discipline is one of the most confusing and challenging topics that parents grapple with. When you look up the word discipline in the dictionary the first definition is "punishment". But this is a relatively new way of understanding the word. Until a couple of hundred years ago, to be disciplined meant to be shown a way to follow. This webinar, presented by Dr Justin Coulson is for every parent who has ever been so desperate to get their kids to 'behave' that they've tried Triple P, Super-Nanny, 1-2-3 Magic, and pretty much everything else out there, and still found themselves stuck. It explores the concept of discipline and how parents can encourage good behaviour in children.

- how we get discipline wrong and why
- real world examples of discipline that are as imperfect as parents and their kids, but that still work

School Projects and Facilities Update

The Multipurpose Sport Court Facility

The Sport Court upgrade is now in its final stages of completion and is starting to take shape. Over the school holiday break, heavy drilling occurred to allow for all court posting and structures to be installed and the grandstand seating and overhead covering was completed. The final stages, over the next four weeks, will include the installation of a perimeter fence, painting of the court surface and the installation of bench seating around perimeter grassed areas.

Weather permitting, this space should be completed and ready for use by the school community in the second half of the term. It is very exciting to see this space come to life and to know that completion and handover of the new SGGHS Sport Court is not far away.



LED Lighting Upgrade

In 2021, St George Girls High School was chosen to participate in an initial audit for a Department of Education LED upgrade program, which looked into the replacement of inefficient fluorescent tube fittings throughout the school. The audit took place to record the quantity of fluorescent linear tube fittings throughout the school and specific data was gathered to inform the replacement phase of works, if selected.

Early last term, the school was notified that we have been selected to be a part of the LED light replacement program and this work will be carried out throughout a number of DoE schools in Term 2.

The scope of work at our school has been assessed and finalised, and the contractors completing the upgrade have now been assigned to our school. Each light fitting across the school will be replaced, resulting in a large scope of works, **901 light fittings in total!**

This replacement work will be completed out of school hours and is likely to commence in June/July. Outcomes of the program are expected to include a more efficient and lower operational cost for schools and more importantly a better, brighter learning environment for students and staff.

Installation of Fresh Air Ventilation Fans

An inspection of all NSW state schools was undertaken over the Christmas holiday break to assess the adequacy of ventilation in classrooms and shared spaces. As a result of the inspection, the Department of Education (DoE) has initiated the installation of fresh air ventilation systems in a number of spaces to supplement existing natural ventilation.

This term, an installation of some permanent fresh air fans and associated control systems will be occurring in a select number of classrooms across the school. These fans are designed to draw fresh air from outside, into the room, improving room ventilation and increase fresh air supply where possible. The school has worked closely with the DoE Asset Management team to determine the most effective locations for these fans to be placed and the installation process will occur in the coming months. The following images reflect the types of fans being installed in rooms.



Installation of New Outdoor Furniture – Seating and Umbrellas

Throughout the term, in various locations around the school, the outdoor furniture will be replaced. The range selected has been chosen to match the new furniture being installed in the grassed areas around the new sport court. Outdoor furniture upgrades will take place in the Year 12 Quad, Year 11 Quad, Library area (including a staff outdoor lunch area), outside the demountable classrooms and next to and behind the new sports court area. I would like to acknowledge and thank the Mothers' Committee, SGGHS SRC and the class of 2020 and 2021 for their significant contributions towards the purchasing of this furniture. It will certainly bring new life to the outdoor spaces around the school.



Winter Uniform Change Over and Uniform Update

As we continue to work through the transition to the new SGGHS Uniform from 2022, I am aware that the availability of some legacy uniform items are now running low for students in Years 8, 9, 11 and 12. Stock availability of the junior legacy winter tunic is quite low and (as this item is completely phased out in the new uniform change over), no additional orders for this item have been made. The school is allowing students in Years 8 and 9 to wear the summer tunic with the long sleeve shirt and school tie if parents/carers are unable to purchase a new tunic in the correct size. I also know that availability of the legacy school tie is quite low and the uniform shop has sought out second hand donations from students to fill that gap if required.

During the changeover for our Year 10 students, the uniform shop will be selling the existing senior skirts first, as there is not too much variation between the existing skirt and the new design. The existing stock of blazers will also be sold first before the order for new blazers is received.

As is the case with any uniform change over, the wearing of correct uniform will be a little inconsistent until all existing stock is depleted, and all year groups move through the transition. Families are able to purchase some of the uniform options available from the new uniform suite for their children in particular the new cardigan, jumper and sports uniform if replacement items are needed.

The school uniform is a vital element that unifies our students. Overall the standard is very high, however we would like to see this maintained particularly throughout the cooler months.

Upcoming NAPLAN Tests

NAPLAN tests for all students in Years 7 and 9 is fast approaching and will commence at our school on Tuesday 10 May. Students from both year groups will be sitting four tests, each with varying durations. The four tests, listed in order of completion, are as follows.

- 1. Writing – 42 minutes**
- 2. Reading – 65 minutes**
- 3. Conventions of Language – 45 minutes**
- 4. Numeracy – 65 minutes**

As was the case in 2021, St George Girls High School students will be completing the NAPLAN tests using the online NAPLAN platform. There are many benefits to using the online platform and the school has found it to be an important diagnostic tool that assists our students engage further in the assessment and ultimately perform at a higher level.

The organisation of NAPLAN online is slightly different to when students complete the tests on paper. The NAPLAN online organisation runs over a 9-day test window, which helps schools facilitate the two-year groups within the technology infrastructure that exists within the school already.

The NAPLAN online tests require a 'lockdown browser' app, which when in operation, shuts the computer off to any other operations ensuring no students are able to access external content, websites or support. Due to the secure nature of the online lockdown browser, all NAPLAN tests at St George Girls High School will be facilitated using the school desktop computers and IT infrastructure. The testing sessions and the number of students that can participate in each session is ultimately controlled by the number of computers in these spaces and has been planned accordingly.

Each test session has been scheduled over a double period, however, if students experience technical delays or issues arise that delay the start time, some tests may run over into the next period. On identified testing days, during the periods where students will not be participating in a NAPLAN test, normal classes will run as per the school timetable, continuing with current coursework.

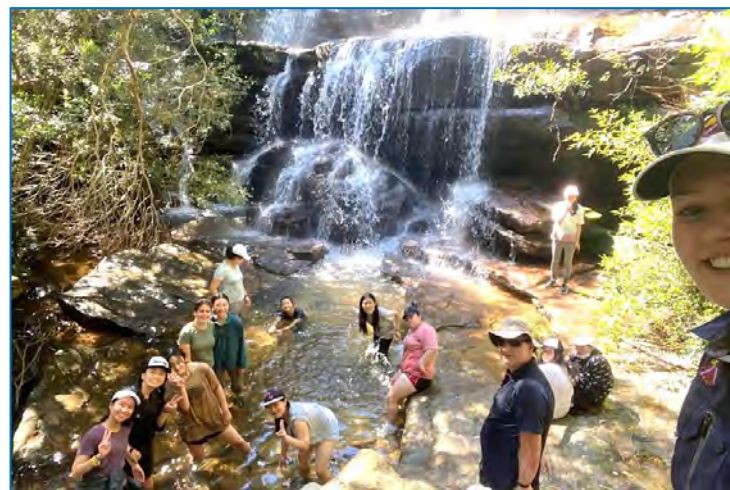
Duke of Edinburgh Bronze (2022 Year 10) Monday 21 March – Tuesday 22 March

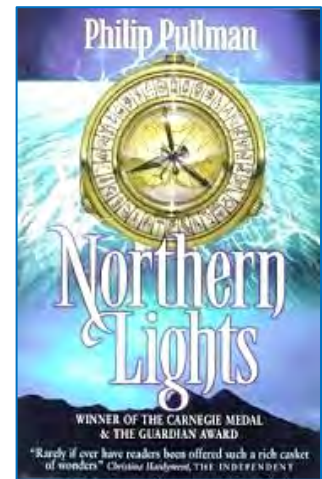
It's not Harry Potter, and it's definitely for older readers, but it's just as good, if not better.
